Every person between the age of 18 and 60 must fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Every person 14 years of age or older must abstain from meat (and items made with meat) on all other Fridays of the year, unless he or she substitutes some other form of penance for abstinence.

**Sacrament of Baptism:** The Sacrament of Baptism for infants is administered upon request. Parents and Godparents must attend an evening class on Baptism in the Catholic Church. Please contact the pastor and set up an appointment for this class at least a month in advance. At least one parent must be a practicing Catholic for their child to be baptized in the Catholic Church. Godparents must be at least 16 years of age and at least one must be a practicing Catholic.

Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick: The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is celebrated upon request, and at least four times a year at all the weekend Masses. Please notify the pastor or call the parish office if you know of anyone who might need this sacrament, but may not be able to notify the pastor personally. Please inform the pastor if you or any one in your family is in the hospital. If you notify us before surgery, we can celebrate this sacrament before you are admitted to the hospital. If your doctor is willing, we can also have a blessing for him/her at the time of your anointing.

**Sacraments to the Home Bound**: Please inform the pastor if you know of anyone who is homebound so that we can insure that they are afforded ample opportunities to receive the Sacraments. We would rather be notified by several people than to not be notified at all, so please don't presume that someone else has already notified us.

**Sacrament of Marriage**: A couple wishing to marry must contact the priest at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. According to the guidelines of our diocese, you should not make absolute plans for a specific wedding date until after meeting with the priest. The couple will be required to attend a marriage preparation course which will include at least one formal program such as an Engaged Encounter Weekend or the Sponsor Couple Program.

### Dear Friends in Jesus Christ,

If you remember the Gospel of last weekend, we know Jesus challenged the customs and traditions of the Jews and Samaritans by talking with the Samaritan woman in public. In today's Gospel we see Jesus is challenging the spiritual pride/spiritual blindness of Pharisees by curing the blindness of a man who was born blind on a Sabbath day. Thus Jesus proclaims to each one of us that-He is the light of the word, and reminds us that spiritual blindness is more cancerous than physical blindness.

Today, we are all living in a strange world, where we complain so much about the darkest side of the world-about war, poverty, corruption, racism, terrorism and many other problems and sufferings around the world without lighting the light that we have in our hands. In other words we are all busy in cursing the darkness without lighting the candle! Yes, we are living in totally a strange world where we have a microscope to see tiny things and a telescope to see distant things, but often we do not see what is closest to us. We know more about celebrities than our next door neighbors or family and friends. Yes, so many things distract us from what really matters. Saint Theresa of Calcutta said: *"I think the world today is upside down…we have no time for our children, we have no time for each other; there is no time to enjoy each other. In the home begins the disruption of the peace of the world."* 

Dear friends, this Sunday, let us ask Jesus to heal our blindness, particularly our failure to see those close to us. Let us pray to the Lord to help us to see our children, our family members, and our fellow parishioners. In order to experience the healing from our blindness, the first reading of today clearly reminds us that do not judge anyone from his/her appearance because the Lord looks into the heart. Yes, to see the heart of the other person we need the light of Christ in our lives. As Catholics, by receiving the lighted candle from the priest, we all have received the light of Christ at the sacrament of Baptism. And today the question is did we care for that light of Christ to burn brightly in our lives? Those who stood as parents and God-parents at the time of Baptism, please check for yourselves-how responsible you were to the commitment you made on behalf of that little child? Yes dear friends, it is our negligence to respond to the light of Christ, which makes this world more darkened and problem filled. So as Catholic, let us not forget that we have a major role to play to brighten this world through our lives of Faith, Hope and Charity.

If you listened attentively to today's Gospel, you notice the gradual insight the blind man developed about Jesus. The same kind of progression, we could find in last weekend Gospel too in the case of the Samaritan woman (*Sir-Prophet-Jesus Christ/Messiah*). At first, the blind man sees Jesus as "<u>the Man called Jesus</u>." When the Pharisees questioned him about Jesus, the blind man said, "<u>He is a Prophet.</u>" Lastly, when Jesus asked the blind man if he believed in <u>Jesus as son of Man</u>, he said "I do believe" and he worshipped Him. The practical lesson for us here is that, believing and worshiping go together. Today, we have so many people willing to say "I Believe" but they seldom have time to worship.

Although we may not be blind like Pharisees, if we were we would not be here but, sometimes we are like the parents of the blind man who hesitated to give witness to Christ for the healing He has done to their son for fear of the Jews. During this Mass, let us pray that we continue to come to know Christ as our Light and, our Savior and proclaim His greatness without any fear. **God Bless You!**
