





Dear Friends in Jesus Christ,  
 Once Bishop Fulton J. Sheen was approached by a woman complaining about her brother, William. She advised him that her brother had been sick for many years, and he was away from the sacrament of confession for many years. Until now, more than twenty priests have tried to change his mind, and none could succeed so as a Bishop will you be able to make an attempt. Bishop Fulton J. Sheen went to William and spent only five minutes with him on the first day. On the second day, Bishop Fulton visited him for ten minutes. He continued his visits with William for the next forty days, and on the 40<sup>th</sup> day, Bishop had gone to him with Holy Communion. Bishop told William that tonight you are going to die. William said, "Yes I know that". The Bishop asked him if he would like to reconcile with God before death, William replied that he did not asked the Bishop to please leave his room. Bishop stated that today he did not come alone, but he had a friend to visit him. William asked who the friend was who came to see him. Bishop replied that he had brought Christ with him and do you want Christ also to be out of your room? William got angry with Bishop Fulton J. Sheen and told him to get out. Bishop began to leave his room, but he turned back and advised William, to at the time of his death to not forget to say, "Lord Have Mercy". William said, "No, I will not say". At around 4:00 a.m., Bishop Fulton J. Sheen received a call from the nurse informing him that William had passed away. Bishop asked the nurse about his last moments of death and the nurse reported to Bishop that sometime after your leaving, he began to say, "Lord Have Mercy", and did so till his death. Yes, the presence of Holy Eucharist changed his mind.

Today we celebrate the feast of the Most precious Body and Blood of Jesus, and we read in the Gospel that Jesus is making an affirmation about Himself that, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven, whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world". Hearing this affirmation of Jesus about Himself, we see the people react in an indifferent way and we read that they quarreled among themselves. This attitude of indifference, we can see in today's world. Many Christian denominations are not willing to accept the sacrament of the Eucharist and the presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Disciples and many other people could not accept this teaching of Jesus because they understood and viewed the multiplication of bread and many other miracles only as magic without experiencing the presence of God in everything. The same way, if we do not believe and experience Jesus in the Sacraments and in the Holy Eucharist, no doubt we are going be in the same track of disciples and people who quarreled and left Jesus. Remember, we are called to sit here not as mere viewers, but as active partakers.

By inviting each one of us to eat His body and drink His blood, Jesus is asking each one of us to take His entire life as the center of our life, but does it happen in our lives? The food and drink that we consume every day helps us to gain strength to our body by becoming part of our body. By receiving the Eucharist as the body and blood of Jesus, do I become part of Jesus' body? Or does Jesus become part of my life? If the Holy Eucharist is not helping us to strengthen our relationship with God and others, we need to seriously examine the disposition of our heart. Since we call the receiving of Holy Eucharist as the receiving of Communion, that means we are called to come in union with Christ, make communication with Christ and with others, and thus to form a community of Christ. Yes, the Eucharist is the source of Communion, communication and community and this we call the Holy Catholic Church. Yes, Eucharist is the corner stone of Holy Catholic Church and Christian life. May you be blessed and experience Jesus through every Eucharist you celebrate. AMEN.

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**Sacrament of Baptism:** The Sacrament of Baptism for infants is administered upon request. Parents and Godparents must attend an evening class on Baptism in the Catholic Church. Please contact the pastor and set up an appointment for this class at least a month in advance. At least one parent must be a practicing Catholic for their child to be baptized in the Catholic Church. Godparents must be at least 16 years of age and at least one must be a practicing Catholic.

**Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick:** The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is celebrated upon request, and at least four times a year at all the weekend Masses. Please notify the pastor or call the parish office if you know of anyone who might need this sacrament, but may not be able to notify the pastor personally. Please inform the pastor if you or any one in your family is in the hospital. If you notify us before surgery, we can celebrate this sacrament before you are admitted to the hospital. If your doctor is willing, we can also have a blessing for him/her at the time of your anointing.

**Sacraments to the Home Bound:** Please inform the pastor if you know of anyone who is homebound so that we can insure that they are afforded ample opportunities to receive the Sacraments. We would rather be notified by several people than to not be notified at all, so please don't presume that someone else has already notified us.

**Sacrament of Marriage:** A couple wishing to marry must contact the priest at least six months prior to the desired wedding date. According to the guidelines of our diocese, you should not make absolute plans for a specific wedding date until after meeting with the priest. The couple will be required to attend a marriage preparation course which will include at least one formal program such as an Engaged Encounter Weekend or the Sponsor Couple Program.
